**Early Intervention for Social, Emotional and Mental Health needs:
Training and Supporting Emotional Literacy Support Assistants**



Introduction

Covid-19 has brought into sharp focus the essential role that schools play in supporting the social, emotional and mental health needs of all their pupils and families. At a time when emotional needs are heightened, and the complexities of bringing in external services have been myriad, Enfield Educational Psychology Service is delighted to be expanding our Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSA) programme. This long-standing national initiative is a wonderful way to make the most of the skilled staff already working in our schools, skilling them up to plan and deliver bespoke SEMH interventions. Feedback from our first four cohorts shows that ELSAs are a very effective way to build SEMH capacity within schools, and that schools quickly feel the added value from the programme. We look forward to your school joining us.

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What is ELSA?

Emotional Literacy Support Assistants (ELSA) is an Educational Psychology-led national programme, which trains TAs, LSAs and learning mentors to work alongside their existing roles to provide SEMH interventions to pupils in their schools.

What do ELSAs do?

ELSAs plan, deliver and evaluate individual and group interventions for children with social, emotional & mental health needs. ELSA interventions are bespoke to the child or group, and focus on developing:

- Emotional literacy skills
- Friendship and play skills
- Emotion regulation skills
- Skills to cope with worries and anxiety
- Skills to cope with grief and loss

Why use our existing staff?

- Children have early access to support without waiting for external help.
- ELSAs can draw on their existing relationships with children and young people.
- ELSAs can support the child to apply their new skills in the classroom and playground.
- ELSAs can work closely with their teachers and parents in an ongoing way.
- ELSAs pass on their knowledge, skills and confidence to others in school.

What's the impact for children and young people?

- Pupils feel very supported by having 'special time' and being listened to.
- They learn to talk about their difficulties.
- Pupils develop greater self-awareness.
- Pupils' skills and strategies improve.
- They interact more successfully with others.
- They feel better about themselves.
- Pupils show improved focus and engagement with learning.

Commitment need from the school

- Identify one or more prospective ELSAs who are well suited to the role.
- Release ELSAs for initial training (six days or 12 half day sessions when delivered online).
- Designate time for the ELSA to plan and deliver sessions.
- Provide a suitable space for ELSA work.
- Allocate funds to develop a bank of resources over time.
- Offer careful line management to identify suitable pupils and support planning, implementation and evaluation and communication with parents.
- Ensure that your ELSAs attend half termly group supervision sessions with the Educational Psychology Service (1.5 hrs, half termly).

The Educational Psychology Service's commitment to you

- We offer six days (or twelve half days if held online) of high quality training which prepares your ELSAs for their new role in school.
- We work collaboratively with your ELSA's line manager to embed your ELSA offer fully within school life.
- We provide ongoing half termly group supervision to support ELSAs with their practice (there is a cost for this).
- We facilitate a termly network meeting which connects your ELSAs with those in other Enfield schools.

Cost to schools

Initial Training

Enfield EPS is now offering funded ELSA training for up to 32 trainees. This includes six full days training in the Autumn term.

Enfield ELSA Network Membership

On completion of the training, qualified ELSAs will join the Enfield ELSA Network at a cost of £300/year. This includes

- Half termly ELSA supervision (1.5 hours) with an Educational Psychologist and Assistant Educational Psychologist
- Termly half day Enfield ELSA network meeting

This is compulsory if you wish to continue to offer ELSA provision in your school.

For ELSAs beginning training in Autumn 2022, schools will be invoiced for membership to the Enfield ELSA Network for the Spring term (£100) in January 2023.

After this, schools will be invoiced for the full Enfield ELSA Annual Membership (£300) in the new financial year, April 2023.

Feedback from other schools

Your ELSAs will be part of a growing network of Emotional Literacy Support Assistants across Enfield schools.

We offer regular information sessions for schools who are interested in training ELSAs. The training course will take place once a year, in the Autumn term. The next training course will take place in the Autumn term 2022.

This will be face-to-face, but may be switched to online training if Covid restrictions require this.

Frequently asked questions

How many ELSAs should we train?

Two or more is ideal, since your ELSAs can support each other and work as a team. Some of our schools have started well with one ELSA, with a view to training further ELSAs when they can. ELSA isn't just a training course; it's a weekly provision in school. We therefore suggest that you think about how much ELSA time you can protect each week for planning and delivery.

How much time do ELSAs need in school?

After the initial training course, your ELSAs will be ready to work in their ELSA role for part of the week. The ELSA network recommends a minimum of one day per week per ELSA for planning and delivery. Across our Enfield schools, ELSAs have between one day a week and a full-time ELSA role.

Is the annual membership optional?

The national ELSA network requires that ELSAs have ongoing supervision from a local Educational Psychology Service in order to maintain their registration. Enfield EPS therefore requires that schools subscribe to the annual membership, which includes the half termly group supervision sessions and termly network meetings.
